Additional breastfeeding and lactation support resources

Breast pumps, aids, and supplies support	<p>Breast pumps are covered by most insurances and Medicaid: Contact your insurance or HMO advocate by calling the number on the back of your insurance card to determine your breast pump coverage and where you can go to get your insurance covered pump. If you have ForwardHealth, your health care provider will need to complete the ForwardHealth Breast Pump order form to get a pump. You are encouraged to have this completed prior to delivering your baby to reduce any potential delays in receiving a breast pump.</p> <p>Breast pump seems to not be working properly? Contact the manufacturer customer service of your pump. Many have an online chat feature and a phone number to text or call. They have trained lactation staff that can help troubleshoot your concerns, ensure the pump is put together properly and settings are appropriate. They may be able to replace your pump if it is malfunctioning and under warranty.</p> <p>Breast pump replacement pieces will be needed due to wear and tear and if become damaged or moldy. Replacement pieces include valves (duckbills or membranes), back flow protectors, tubing, breast shields/flanges, etc. Each manufacturer has recommendations on when and how often to replace pieces. You are encouraged to have an extra pair of valves (duckbills or membranes) on hand to ensure continued pumping. You can purchase parts through the manufacturer or look online to find another source.</p> <p>Breastfeeding aids and supplies such as, milk storage bags and nursing and hands-free pumping bras, etc. can sometimes be found at Target, Walmart, Buy Buy Baby, Amazon, and breast pump manufacturers.</p>
Workplace support	<p>Federal law: Break Time for Nursing Mothers Law requires most employers to provide:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • break time and a place for an employee to express breast milk for their nursing child for 1 year after the child's birth each time such employee has a need to express the milk. • a place, other than a bathroom, that is shielded from view and free from intrusion from coworkers and the public, which may be used by an employee to express breast milk. <p>See the Online Workplace Guide for resources to help make working and breastfeeding a success.</p>

Wisconsin Right to Breastfeed Law	<p>253.165 Right to breast-feed. A mother may breast-feed her child in any public or private location where the mother and child are otherwise authorized to be. In such a location, no person may prohibit a mother from breast-feeding her child, direct a mother to move to a different location to breast-feed her child, direct a mother to cover her child or breast while breast-feeding, or otherwise restrict a mother from breast-feeding her child as provided in this section.</p>
